On June 5, at the McNally Robinson Bookstore in Winnipeg, over 130 people attended the long-awaited launch of Besel's collection of short stories, Lessons from a Nude Man. The crowd at the McNally launch purchased almost all of the copies. At one point, event staff worried that some people in the line-up would not get a book. Many writers from Winnipeg and various Manitoba communities showed up, along with other fans of Besel's work, including people from Powerview-Pine Falls, St. Georges, Lac du Bonnet, Beausejour, and the Whiteshell. Some folks came from as far away as Minnesota and Vancouver Island. According to reports, this launch attracted the most people in the history of Hagios Press. Also, on the Saturday of June 13, the Winnipeg Free Press listed Lessons from a Nude Man at number one spot in McNally Robinson's Bestsellers chart (Paperback Fiction category). John Toews, event coordinator of McNally's, called the launch a "resounding success" and expressed his great pleasure that so many rural people attended.

Artist of the Month
Diane De Pauw

For this month, the Winnipeg River Arts Council features multi-media visual artist, Diane DePauw, from Lac du Bonnet. She grew up in Morris, but moved to Winnipeg where she worked as a teacher.

After fourteen years in Winnipeg, her love of travel led her to pursue a career as an international educator, living and teaching in England, Thailand, Viet Nam, Tanzania, and Venezuela. In summers, she often visited her sister's cottage on the Lee River. She loved the area and eventually bought a house the town of Lac du Bonnet.

DePauw's great inspiration is nature and she spends a great deal of time in the surrounding forests. They provide many of the materials she uses, such as pine cones, tree branches, bark, flowers, and leaves. She incorporates these elements into her work, also using acrylic paint, ink- stamping, pencil crayons, paper, and canvas.

Five years ago, DePauw took a two-week course offered by the Model Forest, called "Non-Timber Forest Products." This course taught the participants how to use natural objects to make artistic creations and other useful items.

Four years ago, the drive to create grew stronger and she started to think about art more seriously. She had already learned plenty from artists who taught in the many schools where she worked, all over the world.

In Viet Nam, she spent more and more time with artist friends, watching them work, looking on-line, and finding pictures of art she liked. She says, "I regretted that the art supplies found in North American stores like Michael's, were not available to me, but the markets, and nature, provided me with materials."

DePauw has not exhibited her art, but has given lots away as gifts. She says, "After a career that demanded so much structure and planning, art gives me the freedom to explore aspects of myself that I never knew were there."

The Churchill Artists' Residency supports professional artists from Manitoba to undertake two week residencies in Churchill, Manitoba, at the Churchill Northern Studies Centre (CNSC). Founded in 1976, the CNSC provides various services to researchers working on a diverse range of topics of interest to northern science.

Tanja Woloshen is the artist-in-residence at the Churchill Northern Studies Centre: June 24 - July 8

Tanja is a dance artist and educator whose creative practice explores transformation and inclusive ways of seeing. In 2013, Tanja debuted a half-length dance work, Encounters of the Man Kind, a mythopoetic investigation of men and intimacy, inviting audiences to look at the relations between space and the body. Tanja's current work explores the human relationship with nature and intrinsic wildness. Recent projects also include dancing for Lise McMillan, Sarah Anne Johnson, Jolene Bailie, Natasha Torres Garner, and Mia Van Leeuwen.



Churchill Artists' Residency



While in residence at the Churchill Northern Studies Centre, Tanja will undertake research in preparation for a future dance production project titled Holy Wild. This work will explore Tanja's interests in non-linear narratives, the multiplicity of identities, recognition and ecology. Research for Holy Wild will involve reading anthropological and shamanic writings about transformational experiences with nature, and excursions into nature to gain embodied knowledges of Manitoba's northern wilderness.
