#### **Rural Youth Mentorship**

On January 6, 2016, three students from Lac du Bonnet Senior School will start a five month creative writing mentorship with author Donna Besel. The students are Megan Locke, Kailey Hansen, and Kathleen Harland. This program is organized by Winnipeg River Arts Council in partnership with ACI (Creative Manitoba). Funded by ACI, the mentorship program develops the skills of rural youth, aged 16-24, who have shown an interest in pursuing a career in the arts. This is the sixth year in a row that WRAC has offered the program. During the mentorship, participants meet for artistic discussions and complete projects. Past mentorships have included youth from Pinawa, Powerview-Pine Falls, and Lac du Bonnet, mentored in photography, visual arts, and writing. Please contact WRAC if you are interested in being a mentor or know of suitable youth.

#### **Artists in the Schools**

From January 11 to 15, the students at Centennial School in Lac du Bonnet will participate in creative writing workshops with author Donna Besel. This residency is sponsored by Manitoba Arts Council, through their Artists in the Schools Program. The focus will be on creating stories based on the Seven Teachings of the Anishinaaabe, using animals as characters in their stories.

### Featured Artist of the Month Erika Uustalu-Nicholson

For this month, WRAC features Erika Uustalu-Nicholson, who creates both fabric and visual art. Born to Estonian parents who came to Thunder Bay, Ontario, after World War II, she says, "From an early age, my family instilled in me an appreciation of nature and art."

Upon graduating from high school, she was accepted at both the Ontario College of Art and the Faculty of Fine Arts at the University of Manitoba. She could not decide which school to attend until a close friend was also accepted at the U of M. This led her to venture out west.

She says, "One doesn't realize the life-changing enormity of our youthful decisions until much later."



But Uustalu-Nicholson doesn't regret her decision. She has enjoyed a satisfying career as an art teacher in the Interlake and Winnipeg School Divisions. She raised her family in Manitoba and exhibited her art, predominantly drawings and paintings, over the past several decades at various galleries and venues.

Upon retirement, she moved, with her husband Archie, to the Lac du Bonnet area. Through various fishing trips, they had come to know the region. They live along the Pinawa Channel where they enjoy the inspiration of nature and close friendships with neighbours.

Currently, Uustalu-Nicholson is associated with various creative individuals and groups including WRAC, Pinawa Art 211, Gwen Fox and Wayne Arthur Galleries, the Prairie Edge Rug Hookers, and the GAWMYS (Good Art Won't Match Your Sofa) artists. In 2015, she helped organize and participated in the Eastman Judged Art Exhibition in Lac du Bonnet, and received awards in the Drawing and Fibre categories.

Uustalu-Nicholson sums up her artistic passion with these words, "Art has been my study, my career and my therapy during my whole life. Over the years, my work has evolved and changed in media and style but the underlying currents and subjects have remained quite the same - the world of nature and the many facets of the human condition - both inner and global."

# Iceland Performing Arts Residency

The Iceland Performing Arts Residency supports professional Manitoban performing artists to undertake a one-month residency in Skagaströnd Iceland, at the Nes Artist Residency. The Nes Artist Residency is one of the larger artist residences in Iceland and is located in Skagaströnd a small town in the northwest. Nes hosts between 90-120 international artists per year.

Nes is a multidisciplinary process-based residency that aims to provide opportunities for global artistic exchange, as well as an immersive space for creation/development of projects. Due to the intimate relationship between Nes and the community of Skagaströnd Nes also places an emphasis on community engagement and collaboration.

Artists are expected to speak about their work at an artist presentation following arrival and to share their work at an open studio at the end of their residency. There will also be opportunities to engage in other programmed events held by Nes, including a community pot-luck dinner.

Residence accommodation is a private bedroom in a shared house with other artists. Studio space is a designated work space in an open-plan shared studio. # WRAC Featured Artist of the Month Vivian Thomson

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features artist Vivian Thomson. In July of 1968, she arrived from Ottawa, with her husband, hired by AECL. Recently married, they carried their possessions in a half ton truck. Thomson already had two years of teaching experience and she soon started at F.W. Gilbert School, instructing grade five students.

From childhood, Thomson drew, and played with clay from the creek at her aunt and uncle's farm. She says, "I attended Fisher Park High in Ottawa, where I studied and practiced art: painting, drawing, pottery."

Self-taught until she completed her Master's Degree in Art Education at University of Victoria (1984-87), Thomson works mainly in oils but has training in water colour, acrylic, inks, pottery, fibre work, printmaking, and stained glass. She says, "Some phenomenal artists instructed me: Marion Small, Margaret Travers, Bill Zuk, printmaker Geoff Hodder, potter Walter Dexter. Their philosophies changed my art direction. I was a better teacher and artist because of their influences."

She developed her own art curriculum in Pinawa. In 1980, she became the district's art specialist, teaching grades one to twelve. She also wrote and piloted art curricula for the Manitoba Department of Education. Until 1998, she worked in Pinawa schools and then left due to illness.

In the 70's, she helped found Pinawa Art 211. This organization includes members from the whole region. Over the years, it has hosted exhibits, sales, and shows. Interest waned but was revived by the Green Water Exhibition and now this group boasts an active gallery and teaching presence in Pinawa.

In 1986, she exhibited her work at University of Victoria. Her art has also been used to raise funds for "The Friends of Old Pinawa." She has worked on three murals, two at F.W. Gilbert School (one with WRAC artist Annie Bergen), and the other at the Pinawa Mall. In honour of Pinawa's fortieth anniversary, she created a commemorative painting.

Thomson says, "I was too busy teaching and raising four boys to compete for awards. But I always have a market for my work. I've done personal paintings for our home, family and friends."

Now retired, her health has improved, and she continues to paint and teach. She says, "I realized how short life is. I urge people to find the time to follow their passion, whatever it is."

#### WRAC FEATURED ARTIST OF THE MONTH - DAVID SCHELLENBERG

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features pen and ink artist, David Schellenberg.

Born and raised in Winnipeg, he moved to Pointe Du Bois in 2012.

As a child, Schellenburg happily drew for hours, if someone handed him a crayon or pencil. When he was four years old, a college student, boarding with his family, asked him to draw a horse. Then she made a big fuss about the details and likeness of his depiction.

After that, he was hooked - not only on making art, but also on the resulting attention and emotion. This gratification motivated him; he wanted everything he did to be "creative." Although he is mostly self-taught, in high school, he took photography and graphic arts, which led to a twenty-eight-year career in graphic design and marketing.

During road trips throughout Manitoba, he photographed abandoned homesteads, churches, grain elevators, or even a fence post, all for possible future drawings. He says, "This is when I felt most committed to my art."

As he got older, Schellenburg found little time for pen and ink. Mortgages, children in hockey, and a career filled with annual reports, trade shows, and meetings all took priority.

Despite such pressures, his creative impulse remained. For example, he started a drawing for his son's first birthday, with illustrations from the daily news. To make it interesting, he added a woman, sitting in a full bathtub, wrapped in a towel, drinking coffee, and reading the newspaper spread on the floor. But he didn't finish that drawing until seventeen years later, in Pointe Du Bois (see photo).

He has given his drawings and limited edition prints to celebrities such as Queen Elizabeth, Princes Edward, Andrew, and Charles, Princesses Diana and Ann, Paul McCartney, Alice Cooper, and many others. His favourite was The Duchess of York, Sarah Ferguson. He says, "Someone pointed out that she received a better drawing than her in-laws."

Schellenburg believes that artists are emotional creatures. He says, "I draw from my soul. I also see emotion in the art of others. Surround yourself with creative people. Then lay ink to paper or oil to canvas, or grab your camera.



On February 17<sup>th</sup>, 160 people crowded into the Lac du Bonnet Community Centre to enjoy a fast-paced adaptation of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's most famous tale, The Hound of the Baskervilles. A talented trio of actors, Toby Hughes, Aaron Pridham and Arne Macpherson, led the audience through a madcap and wacky rendition, playing 17 separate characters. Ingenious set transformations, ranging from London streets to foggy moors to Baskerville Manor, lent an evocative background to quick costume changes, erratic gun shots, strange characters, nefarious schemes, wild accents, and exotic dancing. The actors often broke the fourth wall, making silly comments to the audience and emphasizing the "play" in this funny and frantic play. A 15% discount will be applied to the booth space rental if you submit your application before April 15, 2016. Accepted Vendors will be invoiced with full payment of the Artisan Square Space due by May 15, 2016.

Your booking will include your desired booth space, 1 table, 2 chairs and 2 free weekend passes for the Music Ground of Fire & Water Music Festival. Additional tables and chairs may be rented, additional weekend passes and camping can also be included with your booth rental.



Artists, like professionals in other fields, should be paid for their work.

The CARFAC minimum fee schedule is sort of like a minimum wage for artists. It sets minimum recommended rates for the use of artwork and certain services that visual artists provide.

Widely recognized as the national standard, rates are all recommendations. That said, many arts councils require that public galleries pay artist's fees as a condition of their funding. And artists have rights that help them to get paid.



For example, did you know that when your work is exhibited and it's not for sale, you are supposed to be paid? Unless you have signed over the copyright, no one can exhibit or copy your work without your permission. This is your negotiating trump card – you can always walk away if you don't like the conditions under which you are being asked to work.

# WRAC Featured Artist Steve Young





For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features artist Steve Young, from Lac du Bonnet.

To create his acrylic landscape paintings, he uses photos or paints "en plein air." This French term means working outdoors to reproduce conditions seen at the time. On his travels, he does five minute pen and ink drawings to augment the photos. He also makes strange furniture, odd looking bird houses, and copper art.

Born in London, educated in Surrey, Young attended Mining School in Cornwall. He came to Canada 27 years ago, hired by Tantalum Mining Corporation, bringing Cornish gravity concentration experience to Manitoba.

The great outdoors and friendships inspire his paintings; they represent shared memories and experiences. He usually gives them away. They hang in private houses, corporate offices, and the Legislature. He says, "My daughter Charlotte has a painting in her law office."

Although he preferred roaming the countryside, he saw lots of art in London museums and galleries. From five to ten years old, he was taught by Cyril Spackman, a professional artist, sculptor, and architect. Young recalls going to his studio, filled with large easels and canvases, giant nude stone women, and an enormous carved wooden eagle, destined for a casting in an American Embassy.

At school, he learned about water colours, sketching, lino cutting, and other media. Young says, "I even gained an 'O' level Certificate for a water colour of a snow storm."

In his teens, his mother took up oil painting. When she started making and hanging her art at home, the family finally believed in her talent. A colourful local artist, Leo Walmsley, often visited. Young remembers his work - sculptures, pen and inks, funky scenes.

In Manitoba, after retirement, Young attended Artist Emporium acrylic classes. He has entered local art shows: 2013 Eastman Judged Art Exhibition in Pinawa, 2014 Lac du Bonnet Art Wave, 2015 Eastman Judged Art Exhibition in Lac du Bonnet. Last summer, his acrylic painting won a first place in EJAE.

Young says, "I enjoy creativity, developing new ideas and goals. The Group of Seven is enough to make everyone want to put paint to canvas!"







Lac du Bonnet District Museum, located in Halliday Park, on Hwy 502 & 313 near the Winnipeg River Bridge. Opens for the 2016 season on May 22.

The Lac du Bonnet District Museum collects and preserves area artifacts from prehistoric to early pioneer times. Growing photo displays focus on the regions 27 plus nationalities that through the years melded to form the village and RM of Lac du Bonnet. Opening the door one discovers how hydro dam construction, railway, aviation, timber, brick, pulp, fishing, mining, tourism, hunting, trapping, forestry and farming contributed to the development of this area.

The Lac du Bonnet District Museum is located in a restored hand crafted stacked log cabin built in 1935 by Hans Erickson for his daughter Linnea Tyndall. Hans Erickson immigrated to Canada from Norway in 1904 and secured employment blasting rock and cutting wood (winter) at the Pinawa Dam. He was one of the first to secure a homestead grant of 160 acres north of the Pinawa Dam town site. The cabin was donated by Liz and Alvin Tyndall to the Lac du Bonnet and District Historical Society to use as a museum.

# WRAC Featured Artist

#### JIM BAXTER







For this month, the Winnipeg River Arts Council features Jim Baxter, from the small community of Leisure Falls, just two miles north of Great Falls. His primary art interest is acrylic painting, with his favourite subject being landscapes. He paints various scenes but he prefers scenes from winter or early spring.

His other interest is carving diamond willow walking sticks and canes. The way he creates these canes and walking sticks is different from most wood artists in that he likes to carve through the cane or stick leaving openings throughout the shaft.

Born and raised in Winnipeg, Baxter bought property in Leisure Falls and has spent his last nine summers in the area. He says, "I think that my artistic passion comes from a fifty-two year career as a professional taxidermist, which in itself is an art. I have created many natural settings and painted many backgrounds, to show the mounted specimen in its natural environment."

He has no formal training in art or taxidermy but he has taught both in evening courses at several Winnipeg schools. Although he had not previously competed in any art exhibitions, last fall he decided to try it. He displayed his work and sold his carved walking sticks and paintings at the 4P Festival in Powerview-Pine Falls.

Despite never having won any awards for his paintings or carvings, he got lots of compliments at his first display. He especially appreciated all the supportive comments from Charlie Niedermayer, another WRAC artist. Baxter says, "Charlie is a man he I have long admired for his talent."

Every year, Baxter donates a painting to Cancer Care for a silent auction and donates walking sticks to wildlife associations for fund raisers.

He feels gets inspired by the compliments he receives from the pieces of art he has completed. It gives him a lot of personal satisfaction. He says, "Anyone who enjoys any form of art should always enter contests or displays. You might find just out that others often see more in your art than you do."


Suzie Smith

#### Susan Sullivan

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features visual artist Susan Sullivan, from Lester Beach. Born in Calgary, she has lived in Saskatoon, Winnipeg, Vancouver, and Roland. Five years ago, she left Winnipeg to live full time at Lester Beach.

Lately, with more time and opportunity, Sullivan has revisited her creativity. She works with ink, watercolors, and acrylics, and has recently added pan pastels and oils to her repertoire. She loves colour and shapes, and also loves trying out and mixing different artistic media. Presently, artist Nancy Lou Ateah mentors her.

Sullivan attributes her creativity to her family. As a child, she learned from her artist mother, and her brother, Michael Guindon, an Emily Carr graduate. She says, "Every Saturday, the three of us sat around the kitchen table and painted the day away.



I grew up in a household that was always playing music, singing, dancing and creating art, sculpture, painting, drawings."

As a teenager, she focused on fashion, making her own clothes. Later, she pursued Creative Writing at the University of Winnipeg. In her early fifties, she studied Apparel Design at University of Manitoba, immersing herself in drafting, draping and illustration.

She has exhibited and sold her art, most recently at Lac du Bonnet's 2014 ArtWave Show and 2015 Eastman Judged Art Exhibition, and at Winnipeg's Cre8ery gallery, in 2016. She says, "Critiques at the judged show in Lac du Bonnet were more than encouraging."

Sullivan loves that people say her art evokes emotions, and those who buy it say it continues to work its magic. She gets inspiration from the lake near her home, and the rising and setting of the sun, with various aspects of beach life finding vivid expression in her work.

When painting, she tries to capture what she sees with utter simplicity. She says, "Whether it's acrylics or water color, I'm carried away to a Zen place, whenever I have a brush in hand, pushing paint around. Hours slip away; it seems like minutes."







### KIDS DAY AT THE WHITEMOUTH LIBRARY, WRAC'S FEATURED ARTS ORGANIZATION FOR JULY.

For this month, WRAC features Whitemouth Library, located on Railway Avenue in the town of Whitemouth. The RM provides the space and the library offers free services to all residents of the municipality. Membership has also been extended to the RM of Reynolds.

In 1985, a group of residents, recognizing the need for access to books and the importance of literacy, founded the library. Since then, it has worked to keep up with the times, adjusting to the demand for recreational reading, with popular best sellers purchased on a regular basis, to the delight of their patrons.

It is not a public library, but is run by around thirty dedicated volunteers and supported by the community with donations of cash and books. Of the thirty volunteers, nine are board members. Many of the board members chair committees such as fundraising, children's programs, and special events. Special events include author readings, crafts, and informational presentations. In June, they hold a major fundraising event.

Two recent presentations were "Square Foot Gardening" and "Birds of Manitoba." Volunteers are now working on a program called "Art in the Library" where local artists and artisans can display a selection of their work.

The library stocks specialty books that deal with lifestyle topics such as health, nutrition, and exercise. It also owns a collection of school yearbooks and history books on the early settlers of Whitemouth and the nearby Whiteshell Provincial Park.

Along with the regular services, Whitemouth Library focuses on promoting literacy for children. To instill a love of reading, they feature a large children's book section, interactive CD read-along program, Kids' Day at the Library with storytelling, crafts, and an outreach program that includes reading to students at the elementary school.

For more than thirty years, this small, but mighty, library has shown a great deal of foresight and determination, and nurtured a whole lot of volunteerism and literacy.

Originally from Winnipeg, she has been visiting her family's cottage in the Lac du Bonnet area for twenty-two years. Twelve years ago, she decided, along with daughter and husband, to make it their permanent home.

Goodfellow quotes from Webster's Dictionary - "Art is the activity of using imagination and skill to create beautiful things," and states "I apply this definition in all parts of my life, whether starting a foundation, serving on a board, or working at a homeless shelter." In her real estate business, she applies her natural flair for design work and home staging. She says, "However, my true art form is creating pictures in readers' mind. I use words to drive home a message, educate, entertain, or simply provide enjoyment."

She has written short stories, and newspaper and magazine articles. She prefers nonfiction, but plans to explore fiction. As a child, she felt safest and most comfortable when reading and writing, and her grade four teacher even submitted her Armistice Day poem it to a magazine. In university, she took English courses and has since enrolled in various writing courses.

She belongs to Manitoba Writers' Guild and took their master class with Charles Wilkins. She also hired Jack Canfield as her writing coach, and has participated in programs associated with his work. Canfield is best known for *Chicken Soup for the Soul* books and contribution to *The Secret*.




The Winnipeg River Heritage Museum will be showcasing a variety of cameras at Library Allard for the month of September.

## WRAC Featured Artist of the Month Gary Holden

For this month, WRAC features visual artist Gary Holden, who grew up in St. Boniface. He lived in St. Albert, Alberta for eighteen years but returned to Steinbach after retirement. For almost nine years, he has lived in the Eastman area.

Holden's love of art started early. Right from the beginning, the classical realists and the impressionists inspired him. He was determined to learn from them and read extensively about oil painting. As often happens, his keen interest got side-tracked in his late teens. However, in 2002, when approaching retirement, he found his way back, but felt he could not quite capture what he wanted to express.




Fortunately, he connected with an internationally known classical artist, based in Edmonton, and learned the principles of the old masters and use of monochromatic underpainting. Although he learned these established skills about fourteen years ago, he still considers himself a developing artist. Holden says, "With these techniques, my work instantly transformed and the results were what I wanted as an artist"

Since moving to the region, he has become involved with Norman and St. Vital artist groups, Winnipeg River Arts Council and Manitoba Society of Artists. He's also founding chair of the Southeast artist group and a former board member of Steinbach Arts Council, and has served on their visual arts and exhibit committees. He has presented his work in numerous shows and sales, including Artarama, Red River Exhibition, and Eastman Judged Art Exhibition. In 2010, he had his first solo show at Steinbach Arts Centre Gallery. His work has garnered various prestigious awards from judged arts exhibitions in St. James, Norman, Beausejour, Steinbach, Pinawa, and Fire & Water Show in Lac du Bonnet.

He focuses on realism, with a special interest in portraits, florals and naturalistic landscapes. Starting with a strong composition and accurate sketching, he uses burnt sienna to coax out the warm rich values and shapes, and then adds layers of softly applied colour. He says, "It takes time, patience and dedication to become an accomplished artist. Sharing this journey with fellow artists is both rewarding and inspirational."

## WRAC Featured Artist of the Month Nancy-Lou Ateah

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features well-known visual artist Nancy-Lou Ateah. Originally from Winnipeg, she has lived in Victoria Beach area for forty years.



When she was six years old, an aunt gave her an easel, paper and poster paints, implanting a love of painting. Ateah says, "I was fortunate to be enrolled in the children's Saturday art classes, at the University of Manitoba." As an adult, she studied at this same university's School of Art, learning about watercolour and oils, and the newest product - acrylics. She also studied music, specializing in piano. At sixteen, she obtained her teaching diploma, and ever since, has taught piano lessons.

Over the years, she has enrolled in art courses with various teachers and arts councils and galleries, throughout Manitoba, have hired her to instruct. She often organizes her own art workshops in Winnipeg, renting venues such as hotel banquet rooms. Currently, she is teaching watercolour classes at Victoria Beach. She says, "I love teaching art and music. I feel blessed to be able to work at something I love!"

Although she uses oils, acrylics, and pastels, watercolour remains her first love, given the immediacy and glowing colours she can achieve with this medium. The subject matter varies; she constantly searches for new ideas, such as incorporating gold leaf into her paintings. Her work has been exhibited in various galleries and the Birchwood Hotel, south of Victoria Beach, regularly displays her art. This past June, Library Allard partnered with Winnipeg River Historical Society to showcase a retrospective of her paintings. Right now, she is working on a series of Lake Winnipeg paintings for Winnipeg's Birchwood Art Gallery.



Ateah likes to portray local history in her art, painting from photographs or from old timers' stories. For example, she created a scene of a log house with northern lights dancing in the winter sky, inspired by accounts about the McQueen family, who homesteaded on Catfish Creek in the 1930's and 40's.

Her husband and his Victoria Beach family often packed picnic lunches and took the long trek to this cabin, where they spent the day visiting, singing, and playing music.

She says, "My inspiration comes from nature and from history. If it is too beautiful for words - it has to be painted!"

Andreas Oertel





For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features Andreas Oertel, a writer from Lac du Bonnet. He was born in Germany, but has lived most of his life in Manitoba. Fifteen years ago, he moved to Lac du Bonnet with his wife. They both enjoy living in the area and look forward to retiring here.

His books of fiction are very popular with middle grade readers. Five of them have been published - History in the Faking, Stones of Time, Trouble at Impact Lake, Panama Pursuit, and Prisoner of Warren. His first book, History in the Faking, was nominated for a Silver Birch Award and a Manitoba Young Readers Choice Award.

Oertel always wanted to be a writer. His interest began in his late teens and this passion has never left him. Although he is basically self-taught, over the years, he has read dozens of books on the craft of writing. And he is constantly writing and re-writing. He admits his early attempts at fiction were pretty bad and he

accumulated dozens of rejection letters. But he didn't let that stop him. He says, "I was determined, so I kept at it -- reading, studying, writing, and submitting my work to publishers."

Throughout the year, he does many school visits and readings, but hasn't done any formal instructing. His advice to aspiring writers: read fiction, read books on writing, and practice, practice, practice.

He says, "When you sit down to write your first story, don't become obsessed with perfecting the first draft. In other words, don't stress about grammar, typos, and sentence structure. If you try to make every sentence and every paragraph and every page perfect, you'll get bogged down and discouraged. So spill your guts and complete that first draft. It's satisfying to edit and fine-tune a story, but you have to finish the story first."

## December 2016

In mid-November, Winnipeg River Arts Council hosted a visit by well-known actor and artist Heidi Hunter at the Community Futures building in Lac du Bonnet. During her five-hour presentation, she led nine local artists through a short version of the *Art of Managing Your Career* course, designed by Arts and Cultural Industries of Manitoba (Creative Manitoba) to help artists develop their professional arts practices.

Heidi Hunter owns "Runs with Scissors," a studio-store in Gimli, specializing in fabric and visual art, and she has been leading the artist development sessions for a couple of years now. Using her hilarious power-point, dynamic stage presence, and delightful sense of play, she covered career goals, mission/vision statements, skills wish list, values statement, and timelines.

Heidi also invited the artists to think about their strengths, liabilities, opportunities, and challenges. The group discussed social media presence, positive marketing, and the need to categorically identify their audience or customers. Artists taking the course came from Pinawa, Lac du Bonnet, Pointe du Bois, Powerview-Pine Falls, Molson, St-Georges and Manigotagan, and included various arts practices: sculpture, visual art, writing, photography, music. Some artists named several arts pursuits.

WRAC thanks MLA Wayne Ewakso for his interest in this program. He made a short visit and participated in a bit of role-playing with Heidi. (She showed him how to properly hand out a business card). Thanks also go out to Jennifer Hudson Stewart, WRAC administrator for promoting and organizing the sessions, and to ACI for their ongoing support and development of artists.

The artists in attendance agreed that they had learned a lot, they'd recommend the AMYC sessions, and they looked forward to getting together again to talk about developing their arts practice.

With the close of November, it is time for another update on the Boreal Shores Art Tour.

Like Topsy, the Tour just keeps growing! We have begun to feature the accepted artists twice a week on our Facebook Page (<a href="www.facebook.com/BorealShoresArtTour/">www.facebook.com/BorealShoresArtTour/</a>) and they are also featured in more detail on our website (<a href="www.BorealShoresArtTour.ca">www.BorealShoresArtTour.ca</a>). We are seeing great results from the boosted posts on Facebook and, in one situation, we had a request for contact info for the featured artist within 15 mins of the post going up - someone interested in a purchase! And, this week, one of our featured artist posts was viewed by over 1,000 people within 48 hours with 72 people either clicking on it, liking it or Sharing it. This is wonderful exposure for any artist. We are exploring hiring a Social Media Consultant to help us promote the Tour on Facebook and Instagram both, so watch for more and more coverage on both of those pages.



We are partnering with Eastman Tourism and Travel Manitoba for our promotion - you will see the Travel Manitoba logo - "Manitoba - Canada's heart beats" on our ads and promotional material. We have established an advertising program that will promote the Tour east to Kenora, west to the City of Winnipeg, north into the Interlake and south into the Pembina Valley. In addition, we have received commitments for and, in some cases, actual grant cheques from the Town of Lac du Bonnet, the RM of Lac du Bonnet and the RM of Alexander. This is a great start and if the other RM's and Towns follow suit, our first year will be funded sufficiently to produce a quality event.

We have added experiential venues to the Tour where the public will be able to create small works of art and we are currently exploring the possibility of creating an installation somewhere in the region after the Tour is over, comprised of these small works of art. This has potential to be an annual feature with installations around the region and we believe the public will enjoy returning to our website and/or the region itself to see the finished product and their contribution to it.

We are planning an opening ceremony for the inaugural Tour on the Friday night of the Tour weekend at which the artists, their guests, dignitaries, sponsors and the press can all kick off this first Tour in the year of Canada's 150<sup>th</sup> Birthday.

We have developed a Sponsorship Program for young artists just starting out and for those, maybe not so young, who just cannot afford the fees, matching sponsors with artists to allow them to participate in the Tour with the fees being paid for them. It will be kept in confidence and no one will know that you have been sponsored.

If you are an artist living or summering in this region, you don't want to miss being a part of this exciting event. The sooner you get in on this, the sooner you and your work is included in the promotion! If you have already applied, we thank you for your support.

Keep in mind that the Tour Fee can be as low as \$65. If you sell your work, you pay 10% of sales up to another \$65. If you don't sell, no further payment is required. If the \$25 Membership fee is a problem, it might make an easy Christmas gift for a family member or friend to give you.

Yukon Arts Centre together with Parks Canada and the US National Park Service have launched the 2017-2018 Chilkoot Trail Artist Residency. This residency is a unique two-week backcountry experience for visual artists with a passion for the outdoors. The program invites artists to hike the historic route of Tlingit traders and turn-of-the-century prospectors from the Klondike Gold Rush National Historical Park in Alaska to the Chilkoot Trail National Historic Site in Canada and connect with the hundreds of hikers along the trail, while pursuing their artistic practice.

Each year, three artists are chosen to participate in this cross-border creative journey — one from Canada, one from the United States, and one regional (Yukon or Alaska). As we begin our seventh season, we are proud to announce that the Chilkoot Trail Artist Residency is extending its scope and is now accepting applications from artists worldwide for the 2018 edition. The deadline for submitting applications for both the 2017 and 2018 residencies is February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017.



## WRAC Featured Artist of the Month Jan Claude

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features visual artist Jan Claude.

Before she moved to Bird River, she lived in Winnipeg for most of her life. In 2010, her family's cottage became their primary residence. Settling in the beautiful boreal wilderness of eastern Manitoba helped her develop as an artist.

She said, "I am a self-taught watercolour artist who painted part-time but this is where I am now able to explore the medium in a concentrated way."

Claude loves watercolour as a medium and uses a variety of techniques in her work - from loose washes to detailed crispness - trying to evoke a feeling or capture a moment. She believes that much of the creative process in watercolour is directed by the paint and water and paper - the artist really just guides it.

Every time she paints she views it as an exciting new experience. She never quite knows how it will turn out and finds painting to be incredibly rewarding. She always hopes that she will have captured a moment and evoked a feeling in the finished painting.

In 2015, Claude entered her first juried art show, winning first and third place in the watercolour category. She was also accepted into the Manitoba Arts Network Rural and Northern Juried Art Exhibit in 2016 at the Pavilion Gallery in Assiniboine Park. She belongs to both the Pinawa and Gwen Fox Art Galleries, and the Boreal Shores Art Tour. She hopes to have her website open in the near future: janclaude.ca

Regarding her abiding love of watercolour painting, she said, "I find great inspiration in the beauty and diversity of the land and people that surround us in this great country, and by the hand of God behind it all."


