VINCENT WOODWORKING

For this month, the Winnipeg River Arts Council features woodcrafter and visual artist, Melvin Vincent. A lifelong resident of St. Georges for more than six decades, he is a self-taught artist with a great fondness for wood. He loves depicting wildlife and fish on wood slabs of various sizes coated with oil or high gloss finishes, and making exquisite charcuterie boards.

His interest in wildlife evolved from his time in the bush as a woodcutter for Pine Falls Pulp and Paper Mill. This awareness of nature led to fifteen years of preserving boreal animals through taxidermy. Before the mill ceased operations, he also worked in the thermal mechanical section and, prior to that, he sharpened materials in the stone ground area.

A few years ago, motivated by local chainsaw carvers, Vincent joined the Winnipeg River Carving Association. When some carvers required slabs to make benches, he went out and bought a portable Alaskan saw mill. This purchase opened up a world of new artistic possibilities for him. He has sliced up hundreds of cottonwood, poplar, and other woods into slabs up to 42" inches wide. He applies his artwork to the seasoned slabs to create intricate benches and wall art.






Vincent has no formal training but used lots of step-by-step books to teach himself about painting and drawing. He has also passed some of his skills to his grandchildren and said, "They seem to like it and some are pretty good at it." His words of encouragement for aspiring artists:

"Nature is not perfect. Don't try to make your art perfect. Just do it."

Also, Vincent uses these slabs and buckets of epoxy to create gorgeous live edge river tables. "Live edge" means the bark is not removed from the edges of the logs and the bark fringe adds striking visual interest. These days, his main passion is creating dramatic tables. He credits his wife, Annette, with helping him to make and market their live edge furniture.

When asked how he began making art, he said, "Several years ago, I was injured at work and was immobilized for six months. I started painting on canvas, and then made plaques and signs. After that, I switched to painting and etching on wood and birch bark."






From the looks of his many projects-in-progress and his full workshops, he keeps very busy. He also sells some of his work at summer markets in Lac du Bonnet and Victoria Beach. His business is called "Vincent Woodworking" and interested buyers can view his artwork on a Facebook Page of the same name. It's worth the trip to St. Georges, just to see the magical creations he fashions from large slabs of wood.



TWO WRAC MEMBERS WERE RECENTLY FEATURED IN THE WINNIPEG FREE PRESS

Jen Arnold had to go big to build her pint-sized dream home.

The Winnipegger is one of 10 miniaturists competing on the third season of Best in Miniature. Over eight episodes, the CBC reality show challenges contestants to build elaborate dollhouses for a chance to win \$10,000 and a residency at the International Guild of Miniature Artisans in Maine.

The mini mansions are constructed at 1/12 scale — a tall task for Arnold.

"My stuff is very small," she says. "With the scale of the dollhouses, I could fit about 12 of my houses into one room."

Arnold, a social worker by trade, specializes in crafting teeny-tiny replicas of childhood homes and sentimental abodes for clients. A self-taught artist, she made her first miniature in 2018 as a Christmas gift for a friend and has since amassed a waiting list three years long.

Despite the daunting scale of Best in Miniature (and a strong dislike of being in front of a camera), Arnold decided to apply for the niche, once-ina- lifetime opportunity.

"To go on this show is totally out of my comfort zone," she says. "But whatever, you get to a certain age where it's like, 'I don't even care." After an extensive casting process, Arnold, who celebrated her 46th birthday last week, was shocked to get a callback.

"I didn't even know what to do," she says with a laugh. "This is actually happening."

She channelled her nervous energy into preparation, rewatching past seasons of the show and practising for all possibilities.

"I had never made food," she says. "So I practised that because there may be a challenge with food."

Contestants are also instructed to arrive for filming with the shell of their house constructed. While Arnold isn't able to divulge details of her design or its architectural influences, she hopes the style will be recognizable to local viewers.

"It's very Winnipeg-esque; I tried to incorporate Winnipeg into everything (I did) on the show," she says. "We all created our dream homes and mine is one that I've wanted all my life."

The days on set were long but exciting. Her camera shyness lifted almost immediately. "I would say to my family, 'I'm scared I'm gonna pick my nose on camera,' but there's no time to do anything else but your craft," she says. "And I was one of the rambunctious ones, I was told to be quiet a few times because I was having so much fun with one of my partners."

The biggest challenge was hitting the crafting pace required of challenges. Arnold is a self-professed procrastinator who takes her time making miniatures.

"When they say go, you go," she says. "And, I mean, sometimes glue doesn't dry in eight hours."

Arnold is glad she decided to step outside her comfort zone. The show gave her the chance to connect with other miniaturists, learn new building techniques and receive valuable feedback on her work. It's an experience she hopes to pay forward.

"Getting known in the Winnipeg miniaturists community, I would love to help people and ... share my wisdom because I learned a lot on the show," Arnold says. "There's been a lot of growth and it's a craft that I'm going to continue to do because I love it." Best in Miniature is hosted by Aba Amuquandoh of This Hour Has 22 Minutes with judging by international miniature expert Emma Waddell and interior designer Micheal Lambie.

Season 3 premières on Boxing Day with all episodes available to stream on CBC Gem and back-to-back episodes airing Tuesday through Friday next week on CBC TV.

CHEKHOV OF THE DARP

Pinching Zwieback, Mitchell
Toews' debut book of short stories,
landed on my night table innocently
enough, yet its searing emotional impact
lingers. You can't go wrong with a smalltown setting, and Toews' fictional darp
('village' in Mennonite Plautdietsch) yields
great material.

This marvelous collection places Toews, a Manitoba Mennonite, in the elevated ranks of Canadian short-story writer Alice Munro. Pinching Zwieback could have been penned by Russian social realist Anton Chekhov if he had emigrated to the Canadian Prairies. But Alice Munro is Canada's Chekhov. Can we have two? To minimize confusion, let's dub Toews Chekhov of the darp.

This collection is Munro's Lives of Girls and Women according to men and boys. I've been waiting for a writer to realize comingof-age material from a male point of view; Toews exceeded expectations.

But what about W.O. Mitchell's classic novel, Who Has Seen the Wind? It's about a Prairie boy as well, but these stories have more teeth, more grit. And they are deeply layered and perhaps even autobiographical.

Toews spent more than 50 years in Steinbach, so he's earned his small-town credentials. Every sentence in this collection rings true: the tight-knit social circles, the rigid class hierarchy, the heighted community expectations and the urgent need to transcend suffocating religious constraints.

Pinching Zwiebuck reads like a master class in the short story form. It's character-driven fiction par excellence. As the 20 linked stories unfold, endearing characters re-appear and mature. For the purposes of brevity, this review will focus on the character Matthew Zehen, son of baker Hart Zehen.

Toews doesn't spare these small-town people their daily grind. These characters' lives aren't sugar-coated. They are difficult, the lessons learned painful. But you can't question their authenticity. If you want escapism, read Colleen Hoover's treacly romances. Pinching Zwieback is gritty social realism.


In Fall From Grace, young Matthew Zehen, who fears heights, is nonetheless lured to the precarious roof of the curling rink by his friend Davey. Their mischief is to lob crabapples at passersby.

"I had experienced Davey's leadership in the past — his time at the helm of our spring flood raft and our subsequent capsized result should have been enough to teach me a lesson, but I was slow to accept some truths about some friends."

Matthew's parents' response to the boyish mischief reveals a compassionate bond forged on mutual understanding.

"Your father broke his ankle jumping off the roof of the skating rink into a snowbank with Uncle Shoesnick," confesses Matthew's mother, Trudy. Punishment averted, lesson learned — for now.

As the Matthew character matures, we arrive at the meat of these stories. In Rommdriewe, Matthew's beloved parents have tragically developed into full-blown alcoholics. His father, Hart the baker, is hospi-

Mitchell Toews' 20 linked small-town stories combine gritty social realism and character-driven fiction.


talized, and Matthew returns home alone to survey the damage.

Hart Zehen's late-stage alcoholism is portrayed without sentimentality or false hope. Hart's self-destructive lifestyle has pushed his son out of town and nothing can shift the reader's attention from that painful emotional breach played out as a bedside vigil.

"I had all I needed to put it together. Abe and Dad pounding drinks and bullsh-ting in the shed. Her [Trudy, Matthew's mother] drinking alone up in the house. She was drunk when she found them. Drunk in the hospital and making a scene. She sobered up as she waited for Dad to recover. Her better angels arrived then, together with remorse, shame and guilt. Then a bout of denial, and a trip home to get a drink. Just one."

"Just one" — it's pulled straight from the drunk's lexicon, two words to summarize the alluring and enduring appeal of booze, the oblivion it provides and its firm hold on poor Trudy (and Hart). What else could Matthew do but leave town and forge a normal life elsewhere? It's a tragic account of a family disease and the tell it exacts.

Bravo, Mitchell Toews. Pinching Zwiebuck is a brilliant debut. These may be "made-up" stories from the darp, but they read like field reports on the human condition.

For this month, the Winnipeg River Arts Council features visual artist George Tanner. Originally from Winnipeg, he has lived with his wife Judy at their Falcon Lake cottage for almost nine years. Tanner already knew he loved "lake life." Since 1961, after his uncle leased a lot on Block 14 and his father helped build a cottage there, he's been visiting Falcon and surrounding areas regularly. Many of his paintings depict scenes from the forests and lakes surrounding his home.

When asked about his arts practices, Tanner said, "I work mainly in acrylics and watercolours. They're both very different mediums so I find that it keeps things interesting to switch back and forth between them. Also, I've recently started writing short stories, something I've long imagined I might be able to do. So far, I've been satisfied with the results and intend to continue."


During the past year, he's been making quirky music videos, using songs he wrote and recorded on an IPad, and illustrated with his drawings and paintings. The first one he did was based on one of his paintings - "Nelda's Giant Cinnamon Buns." He said, "It was well received. I expect I'll keep making these, if only for my own amusement. My hope is someone with actual musical ability will notice and maybe record one or two properly. That would be thrilling but I realize it's a long shot."

Tanner earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of Manitoba, worked as a graphic designer, and has a certificate in computer graphics from Red River College (now known as RRC Polytech). Also, he's taken workshops in watercolour, acrylic airbrush and Despite his years of artpainting. related education and work experiences, he stated, "I learned my art in many different ways but mostly by doing it."



In the past, he has participated in a number of art shows and held a few solo shows. A long-time member of the Winnipeg Sketch Club, he regularly contributes to their annual exhibitions. Also, he has held memberships and exhibited his work in both the former Medea Gallery artist co-op in Winnipeg and Cre8ery Artists Group in the Exchange District.

When asked what sustains his impressive artistic output, he said, "Encouragement is always appreciated. It's great to have people tell me they like the things I do but I'm pretty sure I would continue even if no one noticed. And I am inspired by other people who have had some success artistically, especially people I know. That suggests to me I could do something similar and makes it seem slightly less impossible."



Tanner has won several awards at Winnipeg Sketch Club's annual shows and twice won awards at the Red River Ex Arts Extravaganza. He also participates in the annual Boreal Shores Art Tour, held during the third weekend in August, when artists in eastern Manitoba display work at their home studios. As well, many of his paintings are featured (and sold) at the Hi-Point Restaurant at West Hawk Lake, where his daughter is the owner-manager.


This year, he has several exhibitions planned. Although exact dates in March have not been determined, his work will be shown at Winnipeg Sketch Club's annual Juried Exhibition, in Assiniboine Park's Pavilion Gallery. From May 19 to June 20, his art will appear at Cre8ery's Auxiliary Gallery Show. And, on August 17 and 18, he will again be part of the Boreal Shores Art Tour. RMTC TOURING PERFORMANCE MIX TAPES FROM MY MOM



On February 24, Winnipeg River Arts Council welcomed the touring production of "Mix Tapes From My Mom," featuring the talents of renowned Manitoba playwright/songwriter/ musician Cory Wojcik. Joining him on the stage were Christy Taronno on keyboard and vocals, and Josh Bellan on guitar and vocals. With animated narrative and expertly performed pop songs, they told a story based on real events.

Years ago, when Wojcik ended up with more than 250 cassettes created by his music-loving mom, he decided to write the play.

The songs he performed with Bellan and Taronno accentuated his description of what he called "the best and worst day of his life" - when his mother was admitted with a life-threatening illness at one hospital at the same time as his wife, after suffering months of "Braxton Hicks" contractions, went into labour with their second child at a different hospital.

Once he got permission from his family to explore this personal story, he created a fringe show, with help from dramaturge Trish Cooper, who also directed the touring production. The story takes place in an old style rec room with wood panelling and awful velvet paintings and string art. This all happened years ago; his son is now 13 years old.



Wojcik said, "It would never have been possible if it weren't for the right people saying yes. And now here you are, in the audience, in the middle of winter, saying yes to being here."

After graduating from theatre school, Wojcik worked as a teacher for many years. Prodded by his mother's death, he decided to follow his passion and left the teaching profession to pursue theatre and music full time.

Given the fringe show's great success, RMTC asked Wojcik to present it in their 2024 rural touring season. The show was booked in twenty-one venues throughout Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario, from Thompson to Crystal City to Sioux Lookout. The entire tour lasts about 6 weeks and the play in Pinawa was the ninth show.

Kelly Thorton, RMTC's artistic director, said, "Cory is a consummate storyteller and his suspenseful tale of life and death, laced with the greatest hits of the last 50 years, is sure to make you laugh, cry, and capture your hearts."



The play lived up to her praise. The Pinawa audience responded with laughter, chair dancing and singing, and a standing ovation. Also, Thornton must have really liked "Mix Tapes," because it's included in RMTC's 2024-25 regular season, appearing at the Warehouse Theatre. So, if you want to see it, or see it again, you can catch it there. Or you can drive to one of the other communities where it will be playing for the remainder of the rural tour.

There were 122 people in attendance and the 50/50 draw took in \$450. The winner, Mayor Blair Skinner from Pinawa won \$225, but returned \$60 to the arts council, which was incredibly generous.

WRAC thanks the rest of the hard-working Mix Tapes crew: music director Rusty Robot, set and props designer Daina Leitold, technical director Joshua Gehman, and tour technician Jess Rose. Also, WRAC was also extremely happy to see stage manager Sadie Wannamaker, back for a second time with the touring team, and was especially thrilled to welcome Lac du Bonnet Senior School graduate and assistant stage manager Larissa Shabaga, formerly a proud member of the local high school drama club.



FIRE AND WATER FESTIVAL LISTENING ROOM



For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features Lac du Bonnet's Fire and Water Music Festival. Held on the August long weekend, this annual event showcases a varied program of unique, high-quality performers, including some of the best music Manitoba has to offer. Along with attracting people from across the region and far-flung places, it provides a chance for artistic collaborations and a boost to the local economy.





The festival's roots can be linked to the Old Pinawa Dam Jam, a music festival held in 1997, at what is now known as Pinawa Dam Provincial Heritage Park. Some key organizers of that event, which ran for 2 years, included Victor Lange, Rudy Klassen, Karen Augustine, Sean Keith, Anthony Kost, Clint Chaboyer and Claude Deveau.

In 2007, Sheldon Sveinson and several local volunteers initiated a rebirth of the Dam Jam and created the Fire and Water Music Festival. The newborn version emerged on a small Third Street stage in Lac du Bonnet, during the Canada Day weekend. For thirteen years, this festival, held in and around the Lac du Bonnet Community Centre, presented a variety of musical acts, related artistic events, and markets.



Fire and Water is funded and supported by various government agencies, the RM and Town of Lac du Bonnet, and numerous local businesses and volunteer groups. There are no membership requirements and the event(s) are open to the general public.

"Throughout the year, the festival hosts open mic sessions at the St. John's Heritage Church," Hiebert said. "And we present a concert series, three to five times a year, bringing in musical performances from far and wide,"

In 2019, Marie Hiebert took over, with help from a totally new board of directors and "old" volunteers. They put on the last festival held behind the community centre. For the next two years, they staged smaller events, just enough to keep the organization alive.

In 2022, the board decided to relocate to the former site of the Lakers' Water Ski Club. This spot proved to be a better fit, with access to the river, trees and grass surfaces, and more room for parking, stages, food trucks, vendors, tents, and children's activities.

Hiebert said, "We have no paid staff. We are a hard working group, consisting of a board of directors and over 100 other volunteers. We put in approximately 2000 hours of time to ensure high quality music programing for the weekend and throughout the year."



Stated goals include: promote and support Manitoba artists, strengthen and grow each year, provide cutting edge, high-quality programming, and entice audience members to discover amazing artists at a family friendly and inclusive outdoor festival.

In the future, Fire and Water wants to attract 600 -1000 people through the gates, become more self-sufficient with stable revenues, own more of its own equipment and physical assets, increase pre-sales, and commit to ongoing planning for the future.

Looking ahead to next summer's event, Hiebert said, "Our board transition this year is really exciting. We have a great year planned with a new marketing strategy and, of course, a fantastic line-up. We book mainly Manitoba talent and try to stay as local as possible. And we are very aware of the wide range of talent right here in the Winnipeg River area. Currently we are working on additions to Sunday's program that will be super cool, and we have new and fun food trucks. Another feature of our festival is that camping (tents and RV's) is so close to the site, a joy in itself."


The 2024 Provincial Budget:

TAMARA THOMSON & OSAAT FARM



For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features visual artist, Tamara Thomson. Although she doesn't consider herself a real artist, she works with plaster cast, driftwood, glass, light, rope and all the treasures she finds along the way. She said, "I'm someone who loves to play with different materials, given my current mood. I've worked with buckets of broken and discarded items that I love to bring to life again."

Thomson grew up on a farm outside of Arborg, and lived with her grandparents for the first twelve years of her life. After a move to Winnipeg for high school, she ended up in Dugald with her husband Rob, where they resided for seventeen years

In 2008, they acquired a Lee River cottage. She said, "Although we loved it, in November of 2022, we settled on a farm near Seven Sisters Falls, our final move and one that brings my husband back closer to his home community of Whitemouth."

When asked about her inspirations, Thomson noted her grandfather was a leather craftsman and her nanny made clothing through sewing and knitting. She said, "My nanny was taught by grandpa. They'd both let me play with the scraps and encouraged me to spend time being creative."





IAs well, her Auntie Katie was an artist, rug maker, and poet. Although her aunt's hand were misshapen from polio and hard work, the woman spent hours and hours cutting reclaimed materials, hooking rugs, painting, and writing.

Thomson said, "Also, in my early 20's I was fortunate to visit Wayne Arthur at his studio by Oak Hammock Marsh, and was inspired by his sculptures. He encouraged me to just continue to create and play with different mediums."

Most recently, she spent time at the Sivananda Ashram in the Bahamas with the late great Mimi Sammis. This woman's playful-no-mistakes approach to life helped Thomson feel confident enough to try different ideas. She said, "The colours of the water, sand, sea glass, shells, driftwood and natural materials sparked my creativity more than anything else, especially when I add lighting to the piece."

Thomson does not have formal training and admits it feels like a bit of imposter syndrome being interviewed for this article. She learned through play and having a farm kid's budget. Art supplies weren't available so she used the clay she dug out of the ground, along with plants and parts from the scrap pile. She said, "You can always make something out of basically nothing. It wasn't really art per se, just curiosity and creativity. I have ADHD so I have a significant amount of high intensity interest to many subjects and low level commitment to bringing projects to fruition."



Thomson has taught both adults and children, but not in an arts capacity. Trained as a Sivananda yoga instructor, she has led yoga classes for preschoolers and children with special needs.

In 2009, Thomson organized and hosted "Simply the Breast: Plaster Cast Art Show and Auction" at her studio. She cast more than thirty women's torsos and the group created works of art, sharing space as survivors and supporters.



Then they auctioned them off and the proceeds went to Palliative Care Unit at St. Boniface Hospital and Cancer Care Manitoba. She said, "I was incredibly proud of this event and would love to bring it back this fall."

This spring and summer, Thomson and her husband plan to start sharing their beautiful property with others, and will hold events at the OSAAT Farm, including three flea markets. As well, they want to facilitate and host programs, such as creative classes and life skills sessions.

On May 10 to 12, Mother's day weekend, they will open their store at the farm. On July 5 to 7, their first flea market will coincide with their Grand Opening, featuring 50's and 60's music, some old cars, and themed photo props. Thomson said, "We hope people will dress up and have fun with it. We chose a flea market versus a craft or farmers' market, to encourage diverse collections and treasures and for our guests to enjoy exploring."

The next Flea Market will be August 9 to 11 (70's and 80's theme) and September 6 to 8 (90's and 2000's theme). She said, "I should clarify the items at the market aren't from those eras, just the entertainment and decor."

Once these events are rolling, Thomson plans to focus on collaboration with other artisans, by offering her farm as a location for facilitated classes and sharing studio space. If all goes well, she'd like to bring "Simply the Breast" back this fall and support the Cancer Care Program at Pinawa Hospital.

Her words of inspiration: "For some of us with disabilities, it can be hard to communicate without being considered overly emotional or "too much." Right now, I'm gathering items for a piece that will help me process and convey my feelings on some very complex issues. Art, in all capacities, has the ability to convey emotions when words sometimes can't.'

Moons and Mosaics Workshop

Artists, Knowledge Keepers, local and surrounding community members, the Lac du Bonnet Youth Center, Lac du Bonnet Senior School (L.d.B.S.S.) staff and students, Winnipeg River Arts Council, and the Manitoba Arts Council are partnering and collaborating to enhance and bring art to a space that can be enjoyed by students and community members for many years to come.

On April 21st, over twenty members from the community and surrounding area gathered in the Lac du Bonnet Youth Recreation Center for the second Moons and Mosaic workshop.



Participants celebrated and honoured The Thirteen Anishinaabe Moon Teachings with Knowledge Keeper, Diane Maytwayashing, and explored the mosaic process with local artists Annie Bergen and Serene Alexander.

Many hands, minds, and hearts then worked together to select, cut, and place tiles, piece by piece, onto the mosaic template, bringing Alexander's designs of Iskigamizige-Giizi (Maple Sugar Moon), Namebini-Giizi (Sucker Fish Moon), and Mandaamin-Giizis (Corn Moon) to life.



Moons and Mosaics Workshop (cont'd)

Once completed, the artworks will be cemented and grouted onto concrete picnic tables and placed around the Lac du Bonnet Senior School's Medicine Wheel Garden. The three new tables will be welcomed into the circle of already completed designs: Waabigwanii-Giizi (Flower Moon), Ode' imini-Giizis (Strawberry Moon), Odtagaagomin-Giizis (Thimbleberry Moon), Gashkadino-Giizis (Freezing Moon), Manidoo-Giizis (Spirit Moon), and Makwa Giizis (Bear Moon). Upon the project's completion, there will be Thirteen Full Moon mosaic artworks on tabletops, representing all thirteen Anishinaabe Full Moon Teachings.

The intent is to create a space for teaching, learning, growing, planting, playing, harvesting, healing, reflecting, and socializing. A place for students, staff, and community to experience themselves alongside the earth and all its inhabitants. By including community members to assist with the next set of three tables, we hope that connections will be fostered, and utilization of this community space will be encouraged.

Students from Lac du Bonnet Senior School's Visual Arts class will join Alexander over the next few weeks to continue work on the art pieces. There will also be a few more hands-on workshops for community members to bring the tables to completion.

Organizers were thrilled with the turnout at the workshop and delighted by the progress made on the artworks in only a few short hours of working together. They would like to extend their heartful gratitude for everyone's contributions and collaboration and for joining them on this project and journey towards Truth and Reconciliation.

EASTMAN JUDGED ART EXHIBITION

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features the Eastman Judged Art Exhibition, held on June 1, 2024, at Great Falls Hall. During the COVID pandemic, EJAE only appeared online, so this in-person event was cause for great celebration.

It took weeks of planning, hours of office work by Cathy Gregg (WRAC's Administrator), and bursts of hustle by a volunteer crew hauling equipment, hanging participants' art, and making last minute preparations. But, at long last, the Eastman Judged Art Exhibition was ready.

On Saturday, the show opened to the public. Visitors from all over attended and several patrons purchased art from participating artists. WRAC thanks Great Falls Hall volunteers for all their hard work: operating the bar, catering the gala, and keeping the canteen open during the exhibition.

Prior to the public event, on Friday night, WRAC welcomed local politicians, artists, board members, and invited guests to a festive gala. The Great Falls Halls provided a perfect setting and their kitchen volunteers laid out an appetizing spread of cheeses, pickles, sliced meats, fruit and nuts, sweets, beverages, and other delights.

After Acting President Kelly Murray greeted everyone and thanked them for coming to the gala, she explained WRAC's mission - to inspire and help individuals discover and embrace their artistic identity, serving communities along the Winnipeg River ranging from Victoria Beach to Whitemouth.

Murray also provided a brief history of EJEA. About 30 years ago, it started up and offered amateur artists a chance to showcase their work, receive critiques, and gain recognition. Previously, it took place bi-annually in communities throughout Eastman region.

In 2017, Whitemouth hosted the last in-person EJAE. In the spring of 2021 with help from Manitoba Arts Network, WRAC accepted the task of virtually reviving the event. After jurors met via Zoom to discuss 50 pieces by Eastman artists, submitted via photographs, they announced awarded prize placements.

This provincial level exhibition celebrates visual artists living beyond the perimeter and introduces Winnipeg audiences to their work. The in-person exhibit will be held at MAN's gallery (August 1 -24) and the pieces will also be displayed online from August to December, 2024.





Kelly Murray

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features visual artist, Kelly Murray. Originally from Coultervale, Manitoba, she attended school in Melita. In 1982, she moved to Winnipeg where she lived for 12 years. In 1994, she relocated to Powerview.

In 2005, Murray and her family decided they needed more room and ended up on a few acres near Stead. As of this August, she and her husband will have resided in the Eastman region for 30 years. Living in rural settings, she gets inspired by nature, but also finds beauty in other places, specifically "the rarest spots."


Murray likes to try all sorts of artistic mediums, but, at this time, she is primarily focused on acrylic and watercolour painting with mandalas, landscapes, etc. She also does scrapbooking, card-making, alcohol ink, cross stitch, and sewing. Recently, she started using resin with her creations. She said, "My husband always says it's easier to say what I don't do than what I do; the list is shorter."

Since childhood, Murray has loved making art. Although she has no formal training, she participates in retreats, sketch groups, and workshops. She enjoys taking classes and says she learns something new all the time. As a result, she's now an accomplished, award-winning artist. Over the years, she taught card-making and will be leading mandala classes in the fall through WRAC. She said, "The best way is via experimentation, just get in there and play."




Also, Murray has participated in the Eastman Mentorship program. After the Manitoba Arts Network selected her for their Rural Arts Mentorship Program, she worked with a professional Winnipeg artist during the "Momentum" sessions held from November (2021) to May (2022). At the end of the mentorship, all the included artists' pieces were showcased at Brandon's Art Gallery of Southwestern Manitoba, Neepawa's ArtsForward, and Pinawa Art Gallery.

In 2021 and 2024, she exhibited her art in the Eastman Judged Art Exhibitions. In these events, her work placed third in water colour (2021) and first in pen and ink (2024). Looking forward, she plans to prepare a collection for the 2025 Boreal Shores Art Tour and the next EJAE, and exhibit her work in Winnipeg.











Prior to retirement, Murray worked as head librarian at Library Allard, located in St. Georges. After she adjusted to the new phase in her life, and found time to volunteer, she offered to serve as a board member for Winnipeg River Arts Council. Recently, she took on the role of president. WRAC appreciates her artistic knowledge, organizational skills, and enthusiasm for "getting things done."

Murray's inspiring words: "Art is a form of therapy for me; I seek it out as a method of relaxation. Making art makes me happy, provides contentment, and is a great outlet of release for stress and busyness. Find what helps you and delve in."

WRAC FEATURED ARTIST

Pam O'Leary





For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features Pam O'Leary, an artist who works with standard glass, stained glass, and fused glass. She grew up in Winnipeg, and completed her education and university there. In her late twenties, she and her husband moved to Churchill and ran "Adventure Walking Tours/Nature First Tours." On their guided tours, they provided many happy tourists with great memories of birds, flowers, and polar bears in the raw subarctic environment. When COVID shut down this business, they decided to stop fulltime work and head south.

O'Leary's family has a long history with the Eastman area. Her grandfather helped build the Seven Sisters power plant, her mother was born and raised there, and she spent her younger years roaming the area. When O'Leary's grandfather retired, they purchased land on the Whitemouth River and moved the old farm house onto the property.

She said, "I spent every spare minute at the family cottage. Fifteen years ago, my husband and I built a house beside the cottage, and lived there for six months of the year until retiring and living here full time."



In 1978, O'Leary took a course at Red River with Ernest Ashcroft, a master in stained glass. After this introduction to glass art, she invested in every book on this topic she could get her hands on, started hanging out at Prairie Stained Glass, and never looked back. Her husband bought her a small kiln and had it shipped to Churchill. As well, she took many courses for bead-making and fusing.

She said, "I can't look at a garden, or scenery, or really anything that captures my fancy, without wanting to recreate it in glass. The challenge is in the mechanics and science behind making it work. The joy is in the combination of colours, the play of the light, the sheer beauty of it."

When asked about exhibiting her work, O'Leary said, "I entered three pieces in WRAC's Eastman Judged Art Exhibition. This was my first experience being judged. I didn't win any awards, but I got some really good information from the judges.

When asked about marketing her work, O'Leary admitted at first she gave away everything she made as gifts - if it wasn't decorating their house. She tried a few markets in Churchill but didn't really have time to do it. When she retired, she got a bigger kiln and turned the family cabin into her shop. She named it "Clara's Cottage" in memory of Clara, her grandmother.



She likes to try everything and the shelves started to fill up, so her husband suggested she sell some pieces to make money to buy more glass. This remark motivated O'Leary and her painter friend, Ingrid Butenschou, to open "Clara's Cottage Art & Glass Gift Shop."

O'Leary said, "Ingrid is an amazing painter, and now we have art, and glass for sale. I haven't done any instruction except for friends, one on one. My shop is so stuffed full there would be no surface space for more than two of us."

Clara's Cottage is open Friday, Saturday, and Sunday from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. until October. Both artists recently participated in the Pinawa Market. On August 15, they will be selling their art at the Lac Du Bonnet Night Market, and, on August 17 and 18, their work will be showcased in the Boreal Shores Art Tour.





O'Leary can't help but rave about the beauty of her medium. She said, "Glass is my passion, my happy place. Everyone should have something like that in their lives. From a single leaf to the whole forest, in every light possible. Rain clouds, sunsets, summer gardens, winter landscapes, flowers, dragons, horses. So much incredible glass, so little time."

WRAC FEATURED ARTIST

Michael Hall

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features visual artist, Mike Hall. Born in 1957, he grew up and lived most of his life in Winnipeg. After raising two children and working for more than thirty years as a mental health professional, Hall moved to Pinawa with his partner, shortly after retirement.


This wilderness setting, on the edge of the Canadian Shield, attracted them. As well, they loved the idea of experiencing small town life. They currently split their time between Pinawa and a Lake of the Woods cottage.

In his youth, Hall developed the hobbies of drawing and painting in oils. Also, he attended art lessons at Winnipeg Art Gallery and The Forum Art Institute in Winnipeg. He said, "Perhaps I inherited some artistic inclination from my great grandfather, as he painted a large mural in the Saskatchewan Legislative Building, and was a concert violinist."


In adulthood, Hall drifted away from creating art, as family responsibilities and his job in the mental health field did not leave much energy and time for creating art. Since retiring, his drive and interest have returned.

When asked what motivated him over the years to draw and paint, he said, "Artwork provides me with a portal to deeply explore the meanings and associated emotions of living one's life as a human being."

The professional experience of listening to and gazing into the eyes of the multitude of people he counseled over the decades has influenced his art.



He said, "For example, the meanings and emotions conveyed in peoples' faces are probably why I love painting portraits. Also, I've always felt drawn to the art of masters such as Rembrandt, Van Gough, Manet and Picasso, and their depiction of human experience has greatly affected my work."



Hall has minimal experience displaying his art publicly, and has only participated in two exhibitions. The first was as a child, when he entered a water colour painting in Winnipeg's Shrine Circus Poster Contest, and it won second place



In 2024, he submitted 3 paintings to the Eastman Juried Art Exhibition, and one of his pieces won first place in the oils category (pictured above) entitled "Grace". When describing his renewed love for making art, he said, "Whenever I start a piece, I am never clear where it will take me and how it will look when it is finished. It remains an engrossing experience. I will draw and paint for the rest of my life, because as the case with life, creating art is constant process of discovery."

MAWA mentorships range in duration from 2-12 months, sometimes focussing on a specific media or theme, and often culminate in an exhibition. The in-depth learning that they provide is transformative. Mentorship shares knowledge, experience, networks and support, advancing individual careers and building a healthy, intergenerational arts community.

MAWA residencies provide women and non-binary artists of all career levels the opportunity to research and create in MAWA's live/work apartment. Exchanges with 3 international residency organizations allow Winnipeg artists to experience new artistic communities and professional opportunities globally.





Lac du Bonnet Regional Library

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features Lac du Bonnet Library, located in the Town of Lac du Bonnet. For years, it has provided a much loved gathering place, and, like many local facilities, it has an interesting history.

As the community grew and developed, residents knew they wanted a library. For 15 years, from 1956 onward, Helen P. Smith ran a lending library out of her basement. When the Smiths moved to Winnipeg, due to Helen's failing health, the library moved into Hallie Lavoie's residence.

Due to lack of interest, this home-based lending service was eventually abandoned, and the collection ended up in the back room of The Bay Store's dry goods section. When the store expanded and needed more space, the books were on the move again.

In 1978, due to renewed interest, a library committee was formed. Members consisted of Roz Burt, Nick Ostash, Teri Usackis, Art Van Steelant, Joyce Hanton, Eleanor Lewko, Phyllis Robin, Connie Safronetz, and Aline Preston. While this group worked towards getting a regional library established, volunteers ran the library in the Lac du Bonnet Senior School.

On April 1, 1981, the Lac du Bonnet Regional Library opened its doors in Suite #1, a small apartment on 70 Park Avenue, with a view of the nearby beach. As time passed, the library expanded and also occupied an adjoining suite. In October of 1989, the board decided to build a custom facility and formed a building committee to oversee the plans.

The library has seven part-time employees: Head Librarian Jennifer Hudson Stewart, Public Services Coordinator Laurie Campbell, Clerk Crystal Larocque, Programming Clerk Tannis Smith, Assistant Clerks Ainsley Van Linden and River Lansard and Custodian Donna Kovari. Also, many volunteers assist with maintenance, gardening, programming, and other activities.

Hudson Stewart said, "From fall to spring, we host after school children's activities, including Lego and Craft Club. For adults, we offer Silent Book Club (4th Thursday of the month), Knitters & Crocheters (Tuesdays 1:00 - 3:00 p.m.) and Lego for Grown-Ups (Tuesdays 11:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.) Upcoming events include: Spooky Library, during Halloween Festival, October 26th 12:00 - 3:00 p.m., and Bingo for Books (All Ages) November 21, 6:00 - 7:00 p.m."


The library is funded by provincial and municipal governments, and by fundraising. It's board is composed of 6 members, 3 from the Town (including a member of council) and 3 from the RM (including a member of council).


Hudson Stewart said, "The library works to provide information and resources for the local population, and offer a welcoming, inclusive place for patrons to find resources and community. It serves the Town and Rural Municipality of Lac du Bonnet, along with surrounding areas. Membership is free to taxpayers in the Town and RM. Non-resident and short term memberships for summer and temporary residents are also available."

For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features Bibliothèque Allard Regional Library in the small community of St. Georges, located within Rural Municipality of Alexander. This eye-catching facility provides public access to library resources, programs and services that enhance personal knowledge, joy of reading, and quality of life.

The library, first known as Local Government District (LGD) of Alexander Library, opened its doors on May 3, 1983, after citizens went doorto-door collecting signatures on a petition to establish a local library. After a naming contest in 1985, the library became known as Library Allard, named for Joachim Allard.

Many changes in partnerships and location have occurred over its 41-year history. Today, it is one of 54 public library systems in Manitoba, serving citizens in the Rural Municipality of Alexander, the Rural Municipality of Victoria Beach and the Town of Powerview-Pine Falls. The library has two branches – one in St. Georges and one in Victoria Beach. "The library is always expanding the programs and services it offers to community members and often we do this by seeking partnerships that help us move in new directions," said Shelley

Penziwol, head librarian.

This year the library launched a museum passbook program with Winnipeg River Heritage Museum, where participants borrow a passbook from the library and get free entry to the museum. In return, participants write (or draw) something about their museum visit in the passbook before returning it to the library for the next person to borrow.

he library has partnered with Manitoba Lung Association on two different "citizen science" programs. It lends radon detectors to measure radon levels in indoor air, and recently installed an air quality monitor to measure real-time particulate matter in outdoor air.

The three partner municipalities provide operating funding, as does the Manitoba government. In addition, the library generates revenue from fundraising and applies for various grants to fund special projects.

"We're about to start on a Manitoba Accessibility Fund project that will expand our large print collections at both branches, making our physical collections accessible to more members," said Penziwol. "It's satisfying to embark on new projects that benefit our communities."





The library is governed by a sixmember board, with one council member and one citizen representative from each municipal partner. It has six part-time employees for both branches, including head librarian Shelley Penziwol, assistant librarian Jennifer Kemball and library clerks Kylie Fontaine, Valerie Townsend, Cindy Hoover and Victoria Peterson.

As a WRAC member, the library strives to support and promote local arts and culture initiatives. "This runs the gamut from offering space to hold events, bringing in artists and authors to talk about their work, and offering workshops where participants can engage in fun and creative activities," added Penziwol.



The library is open to everyone. Visitors are welcome to participate in programs, use the services (such as Wi-Fi printing from mobile devices) or simply spend time enjoying the space. Membership is required to borrow physical materials and access e-books, audiobooks and streaming videos from online platforms. Free memberships are available to permanent and seasonal residents from partner municipalities, and non-residents can purchase a membership for a low annual fee.

WRAC FEATURED ARTIST

Rick McCalder



For this month, Winnipeg River Arts Council features sculptor Rick McCalder. Born in Winnipeg, he grew up in Elma and went to school in Whitemouth. Almost 51 years ago, he moved for a welding job at Tanco Mine, arriving in Lac du Bonnet with wife Janet and a toddler. Two more girls were born in Pinawa and all three daughters graduated from Lac du Bonnet Senior School.

He makes art from used cutlery, pieces of metal, beer cans, wood, and other found materials. His works are mainly welded, using recycled and used metals. He also dabbles in wood carving and photography. In 1992, he took classes at Red River College and received a certificate of photography.



McCalder said, "All my metal work is coloured by heat, not paint. I love creating golfers and fishers from railroad spikes, and flowers from sheet metal. I also hand cut saw blades to fabricate scenes in the metal."



In 1966, he took up welding for a career and, at 76 years old, he continues to use these skills. With this expertise, he learned to construct various "characters" in his spare time out of nuts and bolts and other ornamental objects. Like many artists, he put aside most creative activities while earning a living and raising a family.

He said, "Over the years, art got pushed onto the back burner of life. But I always made something for a gift or for myself. I've always been inspired to do metal art and crafts. Now I'm almost retired, art will be on my menu."

McCalder is also known as a former Lac du Bonnet Blues team's general manager. When the hockey league folded at the end of 1988/89 season, he spent all spring and summer reviving it. After a successful season, two Winnipeg teams withdrew and the league folded again. He said, "We had great players, volunteers, and a following. It was a great experience."

Although he hasn't exhibited his work or received awards, he sells his art privately, by word of mouth. He has taught others how to weld for work reasons, not art. Also, he wrote two articles, one for the Clipper and one for Lac Du Bonnet Living.

In 1975, he took flying lessons, as one of six people in the new Airpark school's first class. After leaving Tanco, his work life took different directions. He worked for Holden Wild Rice, building cabins on their lakes and harvesting wild rice. He hauled pulp to Pine Falls and Kenora, and .hauled fuel on winter roads to northern reserves. In Red Lake area, he flew his own aircraft, maintaining fly-in camps.





In the 1980's, McCalder opened a small welding shop, where he also repaired small engines, and sold riding mowers, chainsaws, and trimmers. For 4 years, he flew an aircraft part-time for Hampshire Baits. After he sold the welding shop, he worked as a mechanic and welder for Manitoba Conservation. While juggling these various jobs, he did welding at his home and worked for a local boat vendor, Watertown Incorporated, doing prop repairs.

His closing comment: "Finally, I have time for my art. I like making it and hopefully someone appreciates and likes it.
